In Thrive group sessions we have been focussing on our emotions and what our body feels like when we experience these feelings. This helps develop the children's emotional development as well as social skills, as they work together and tell each other what it feels like for them. We talk a lot about our 'thinking brains' and how we don't always use it when our downstairs brain (emotional brain) takes

over.









We have also been developing our sharing and turn taking skills when playing in groups with all sorts of games. The most popular games we play in our group sessions are:

- Kim's game (you have to hide objects under a blanket and remove them without anyone seeing and they have to remember what object is missing!)
- Higher or Lower (A card game where the children have to work together in order to work out if the card is going to be higher or lower than the card before!)














We've been learning lots more sounds using our **Floppy's Phonics** programme. The children are really impressing us with their segmenting and blending using their robot arms!
























SPORT AT SHIRLEY WARREN

Year 1 loved getting involved in making Christmas Cookies. They designed their cookies, measured the ingredients, helped stir the mixture and cut out the shapes.














In our group times we have been so busy learning lots of skills. We have been counting, learning some sounds, practising our cutting skills and getting very creative.

Technology gifts are often high on Santa's lists each year so it is important to ensure that your children are safe when playing with new devices. To help you over the holidays, here are a few top tips to help keep your children safe online.

Understand new devices

Once you hand over devices on Christmas morning it can be hard to get them back, so it's great to have a go on any devices you buy beforehand. Many devices have controls to ensure that children can't access content you don't want them to. These include settings for online searching, "in-app" purchases and some have screen time allowances.

Setting-up your tablets in advance

Tablets are really popular with children and there are a wide range to choose from, including child-friendly and educational models. When it comes to setting up and using tablets, why not start slowly? Download games and apps you have checked out carefully. Sites such as Net Aware or Common Sense Media provide useful advice.

Games Consoles

Each year there are so many exciting games and consoles around, there is a good chance you might have one coming into your house.

To help you choose age-appropriate games for children most platforms will feature an age rating on the game - downloading and using the game yourself is a great idea to experience first-hand what your child may be watching. Alternatively, you can go to **NetAware** or **Common Sense Media** for more information.

Top tips for the holidays:

- Set boundaries how often can your children use their new devices?
- Apply Screen Time Limits agree a time limit or number of games beforehand, to avoid repeated disagreements around how long they can spend online.
- Sleep comes first we advise that phones or tablets stay out of the bedroom overnight to charge. This avoids those night time distractions!

Social Media

As a parent it's important you know that all social networking platforms have age limits. The following all have a minimum age rating of 13+1 BBM, Facebook, foursquare, Instagram, TikTok, Reddit, Snapchat, Flickr, Monkey, Tumblr.

Many sites include an instant message function which allows private conversations between site members.

- Some app versions of social networks use the location of the phone.
- Information shared between friends can be easily copied and may spread
- It isn't easy to take back information that has been posted and can be impossible if it's already been shared.
- Not everyone your child meets online will be who they say they are. Chatrooms and forums can connect people who are complete strangers and can be unmoderated.

WhatsApp (16+ age rating)

Nation Online Safety have produced a useful guide for parents/carers. The guide has tips on a number of potential risks when using the site such as stranger danger, live location sharing and disappearing messages.





If you share your account with your child you may wish to set up parental controls to help stop children watching inappropriate or adult content.

We also enjoyed all the Team Building activities; Earthquake, Den Building & Amazon Adventure.








Frozen Worlds

We've also worked in groups to research the Galapagos, evaluate different characters and sort figurative language.










This term, year 5 have settled in incredibly well and have embraced all learning opportunities.















In the afternoon, we created our own Victorian toys which we took with us the PE lesson. This consisted of cup and ball relays, tug of war and skipping competitions.






Year 4 has had a very exciting term to start off an exciting 2022-23 school year.

Christmas Dinner Wednesday!


















Year 3

Year 3 have had a busy beginning to the school year! In the first half term, our focus was on **Extreme Earth**. We found out about cyclones, tsunamis, floods, earthquakes and volcanoes. We made our own boats using a range of materials, and worked hard to sew the sails. We then tested them to see if they would float to survive a flood! The weather stopped us doing this outside, so we improvised and used a bowl in the classroom. I am pleased to report that all boats tested survived!

We explored light as the absence of dark and how the different weather conditions affect how much light we have. We investigated shadows and how they are formed. We had great fun playing with making different types of shadow puppets and how they change in size and clarity as they move closer or further away from the light source.



Is my child well enough to come to school?

These are the guidelines we have to follow, provided by the **NHS Healthier Together** website. It is useful information as to whether you should keep your child off school or not. So this hopefully will save you phoning to ask whether your child should come in! If you are unsure, often it is easier to bring your child in and we will always phone you later to collect them if they are really not well enough to be in school.

There are also details about getting tested for Covid 19.


