

Direction and Location Vocabulary	
Key Word	Definition
Great Britain	The countries of England, Wales and Scotland make up Great Britain.
United Kingdom	The countries of Great Britain plus Northern Ireland make up the United Kingdom.
County	A region within a country that has it's own council to deal with local matters.
Cities	A large settlement with a population of over 300,000 people.
Towns	A settlement with a population over 2500. It often has a town hall and has more shops and fa- cilities than a village.
Villages	A small settlement with a population between 500—2500 people. It has a place of worship.
Physical geography	The features that are naturally in the environment, for example, mountains and rivers.
Human geography	Man-made features in the environment, for example, roads and buildings.

UNITED KINGDOM Facts

A country can be divided into smaller regions known as counties.

The capital city of the UK is London.

Wales, Scotland and Northern also have their own capital cities.

Human Geography plays a key factor in defining cities, towns and villages.

The physical geographical features of hills and mountains are shown on map by topographical lines.

The UK is surrounded by 3 seas and 1 ocean.

All rivers originate in the mountains and travel to the sea.
