Children were evacuated from Southampton and other major cities to the country-side—for their safety.


Food and other items were scarce and so rationing was brought in by the Government.

Blitz	a severe or sudden attack; the German air raids on Britain in 1940 - 1	
Evacuation	the process of sending young people to live with host families during war time	
Evacuee	a young person sent to live with a host family during wartime	
Rationing	allowing each person to have a limited amount of certain foods	
Blackout	a time when all lights must be turned off or covered	
Billet	places, often in people's homes where soldiers stay for a while	
Allied Forces	the group of countries who fought against Germany, Italy and Japan	
Axis Forces	the group of countries who fought against Britain and the Allied forces	
Air raid	a bombing attack where explosives are dropped from aircraft onto	
Gas Mask	a protective mask worn over a person's face to help the breathe without inhaling poisonous gas
